Our guest speaker will be Greg Hand, formerly of the University of Cincinnati. Here's his description of the program: "We will take a tour of Cincinnati as it grew from a single cabin to the metropolis we know today, with stops in 1835, 1848, 1866, 1886 and 1900. We will zoom in on the city's skyline and visit landmarks that no longer exist as well as familiar sights in unfamiliar locations - and also discover what appears to be a UFO landed in the middle of the city." Everyone is welcome to attend the presentation, which will begin at 7:00.

Our holiday Open House will be part of the Christmas in Mt. Healthy celebration on Saturday, December 13, from 4 to 8. We will be selling cookies and hot chocolate, and raffling our Mt. The Brutal Winter of 1917-1918

October of 1917 hinted at the possibility of a coming nasty winter. A series of Canadian fronts swept across the Ohio valley, bringing snow and cold. On October 30, the high temperature in the Cincinnati area reached just 31 degrees, a record that still stands as the coldest high temperature for that date. November saw milder conditions, but by mid-December it turned frigid. The high on December 5 was just 5 degrees, and on January 12 it reached just 2 degrees, both records that also still stand today. And these were air temperatures, not taking into account the high winds created by the Canadian systems sweeping southward.

Then there was the snow. The winter of 1917 saw 35.7 inches of snow, the ninth snowiest year on record. For comparison, in 2024 Cincinnati had just 11.8 inches of snow; on the other hand, some may recall the winter of 1978, with its 44.3 inches, or the even worse winter of 1977, at 53.9 inches. So the end of 1917 and the start of 1918 did not mark the snowiest winter recorded in the area, but between the snow, the cold temperatures, and the type of infrastructure and transportation used at the time, things became dangerous.

Madison, Indiana recorded that the Ohio River was frozen solid there on Dec. 11. The river froze over at Cincinnati on Dec. 17. This halted all river traffic, including the barges carrying the coal that was crucial for heating homes and running factories. The snow blocked rail lines, further cutting off deliveries. In January the Hamilton County Fuel Administration set limits on the stockpiling of coal by industries so homes could be heated. It's easy for us to forget how vulnerable people can be to winter weather, but the residents of Mt. Healthy in that season over 100 years ago were all too aware of the danger.

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The tollhouse is becoming a new museum space

Our tollhouse was built along the Cincinnati & Hamilton Turnpike in 1859. The turnpike was a privately operated road, and tolls were charged for its use. The gatekeeper and his family - his wife and several children – lived in the tollhouse, as well. It was moved to its present location next to our museum around 1980.





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Since its relocation, the building has mainly been used as an office for the Historical Society, as a small meeting space, and for storage. We are now planning a major upgrade, as the tollhouse joins the old Free Meeting House as a museum and exhibit space. It will be set up as a family home, depicting life at the end of the nineteenth century.







We also need to acquire some furniture from about 1870 to 1900: a bed or headboard (about twin size), one or two living room / parlor chairs, and possibly a kitchen table with chairs. Nothing fancy, just ordinary pieces that would have been used by a not-too-affluent family.
